The Adventures of Dale

Welcome friends and family to the celebration of the beautiful life of Dale McElroy.

I hope you are enjoying the wonderful video Dale's son, David, was able to put together for us. His son, Donald, is singing many of the songs.

Dale was born in Michigan in 1940. He enlisted in the Navy in 1958 just before Alaska became the 49th state in 1959 and Hawaii became the 50th. While stationed in Long Beach, California his brother, Bob, introduced Dale to Roberta and in 1962 they were married in Charleston, SC. In 1963, while the war in Vietnam was blooming, Dale was in Morocco and became a daddy with his first son, David. Next, in 1964 he had his son, Donald, also born in Morocco.

With two little children, the Navy sent him and his family to Maryland and Radioman B school where the family lived in an old converted stable, in Perryville, MD. The neighbors next door lived in the chicken coup on an old farm.

Dale's next move was to Japan where his daughter, Barbara, was born. She was only 6 weeks old when the family left Japan for a short stop in California to see family before driving across the country to Jacksonville, Florida and more school. At the completion of that duty station he was surprised to get another tour in Morocco for another three years.

With a slight separation from his family, the Navy moved him back to Long Beach, CA where he picked up the USS Guadalupe. That ship then moved to San Diego...with him on it while his family remained in base housing in Long Beach.

In 1975, while on the Guadalupe, he was ordered on to an LPD to accompany the Admiral of Con Serv for the 7th fleet to access the damage to the USNS Jack Pendleton. The ship ran aground due to shifting weather on Triton Island. They had to helicopter him to the location and lower him down to the ship. To return to his ship he had to catapult off an Aircraft Carrier back to the Philippians only to find his ship had left for Hawaii. So he had to hitch whatever rides he could find to get back to his ship. That was quite an experience, he said, for him.

When the Guadalupe returned to San Diego she sailed to Bremerton, Washington to be decommissioned... with the help of his two sons who got to go along for the ride. Little did the boys know each of them were assigned jobs on the ship for the whole time they were on board...and they loved it...being with their Dad on his ship and the memories they now share.

Dale served the last three years of service as a Communications Tech Control Chief of Watch at the Communications Center in Wahiawa, Hawaii.

He was truly honored at his retirement ceremony. The US Navy Band played, his crewmen requested a review of the troops and it was a big honor for him to do so. The base commander presented certificates and plaques to him and they threw a huge BBQ with a more private party later in the evening at the NCO club. He didn't realize how much the service meant to him. It almost made him want to stay...almost.

Dale retired from the Navy in Hawaii in 1978, with over 21 years of service.

Following his retirement from the Navy he returned to Florida and joined the Postal Service. The mail must get through and he had an enjoyable 21 years as a letter carrier with the Post Office.

He couldn't wait to retire because he had a plan. He decided he wanted to travel these United States. So he sold their home in Palm Beach Gardens and moved into a 34 foot RV and he and his wife went off on another adventure in life. He said those years, almost five, were the best years of his life.

In 2005, they sold their RV and settled down in Melrose, FL. In 2008 they moved to Fort Mill, SC to be closer to their children.

In 2021, when Dale started to have health issues and was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease. Dale needed to think things through when his bother Bob gave him an idea, the Armed Forces Retirement Home in Gulfport, MS. He applied for residency and was accepted along with his wife, Roberta. There, they had friends, comfort and all the amenities they needed.

...Dale called this his "last adventure".
